SUNDAY SCRIPTURE REFLECTIONS

April 1, 2018 – Easter Sunday: We can get easily distracted by focusing on the details of the Resurrection narrative. This may prevent us from facing personal questions of faith. Was Jesus really raised from the dead? What are the implications for us when we die? (John 20:1-9)

April 8, 2018 – 2nd Sunday of Easter: We are called to be reconcilers in the world and to contribute to the creation of communities where faith flourishes. The experience of God's peace in our hearts and lives requires reconciliation. (John 20: 19-31)

April 15, 2018 – 3rd Sunday of Easter: We all have some tendencies of the saints and sinners. Do we help our parish to be a welcoming place that is reflective of God's mercy? Is the church a hotel for saints or a hospital for sinners? (Luke 24:35-48)

April 22, 2018 – 4th Sunday of Easter: Today's Gospel offers both comfort and a challenge. The comforting good news is that Jesus, the Good Shepherd, knows us, provides for us, and loves us. The challenge is that we are called to be good shepherds to those entrusted to our care; those of us who are parents, teachers, and spouses. (John 10: 11-18)

April 29, 2018 – 5th Sunday of Easter: The parable of the vine and branches is a wonderful metaphor and a reminder to us to prune away the baggage in our lives that constantly robs us of the energy to live our lives as fully as possible in the love of God. (John 15:1-8)

As disciples of Jesus Christ, we know that Easter is not about bunnies or chocolate or eggs. Easter is an event that makes a claim on each one of us.
