Gospel Reflections November 2018

November 4, 2018 – 31st Sunday on Ordinary Time: Jesus' answer to the scribe combines two laws as stated in Deuteronomy 6:4-5 and Leviticus 19:18. The stress is on interiority rather than external ritual observance. (Mark 12: 28-34)


November 11, 2018 – 32nd Sunday in Ordinary Time: The story of the two widows teaches us that God loves us where we are and in the way he finds us. He also loves us enough to not leave us there. (Mark 12: 38-44)

November 18, 2018 – 33rd Sunday in Ordinary Time: The readings can be fearful and misunderstood. However they also offer us a fearless challenge calling us beyond the distress of our times and to forgive to the point that there will no longer be a need for an offering of sin. (Hebrews 10:18)

November 25, 2018 – Solemnity of Christ the King: We are assured that God has the ultimate supremacy over the earth. The voices of chaos and hatred will be over and the Word of God that spoke life into us will be the final word.

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Once again, God's people have been senselessly attacked while participating in a worship service.

As you have heard by now, on Saturday, October 27, 2018, a lone gunman entered the Tree of Life Synagogue in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania and opened fire on those attending a bris ceremony (the Jewish circumcision service and naming ceremony for a male in his eighth day of life), killing eleven (11) people and wounding six (6), four (4) of whom were Pittsburgh Police Officers who responded to the scene. I heard from one of my FBI Academy Classmates, who commands the Homicide Unit for the Pittsburgh Police Department, who told me his officers will survive their injuries, although one of them was seriously wounded and it was "touch and go" for that officer for the first several hours at the hospital. He added they are grateful they have some of the best trauma hospitals in the country in Pittsburgh and that God was watching over the surgical teams treating the officers. They appreciate the thoughts and prayers being sent their way for their recovery.

Let us remember all victims of violence, especially the victims and their families of this tragedy in Pittsburgh, and pray for an end to these senseless acts of destruction perpetrated by those who seek to diminish our quest for peace in this world. Let us also pray for the first responders (Police, Fire, EMS) who rushed to the scene to render aid in the victims' times of need.

To the People of Pittsburgh, our brothers and sisters of the Jewish Faith, and all victims of violence, we stand and pray with you and for you during this difficult time.

Lord, we pray that you make us instruments of your peace.

On a happier note...
